In particular, they focus on China's prevalent use of economic coercion over the past twenty-eight years and its impact on the rules-based liberal international order. This book assembles, for the first time, comprehensive data on all of China's acts of economic bullying against other states, as well as against private companies and individuals. The authors also investigate, both in theory and practice, strategies for countering the weaponization of interdependence by the United States, China, or other actors, introducing the concept of "collective resilience" as a way to combat the weaponization of interdependence. Synthesizing new insights from trade data with traditional deterrence theory in the national security field, this book provides a comprehensive overview of a major phenomenon in global economic statecraft as well as solutions for nations wishing to counter it."
